ROCHESTER INSTITUTE OF PRACTICAL Education.

THE constitution of this Seminary requires, that instruction be given in all the branches of Natural Science, which are useful in the practical duties of life. The Directors of the Institution have elected Prof. OATMAN, Lecturer on Chemistry and the kindred branches. The funds of the Institution not being adequate to his support, Mr. Oatman is expected to open a Course of Lectures for a Class, who are not Members of the Institute. Chemistry will occupy the present term, and instead of the plan usually pursued, according to which the student sits at a distance, hears the Lecture, and sees the experiment of his Instructor, without the privilege of making the experiments for himself,—he is required to enter the Laboratory, and with his own hands to make the preparations and perform the experiments, and before his class deliver a lecture on each subject previously presented by his Instructor. In addition to this, he is required, at intervals, to visit all the workshops and manufacturing establishments, where the principles are practically applied. This course, with reading and attention to style and manner, will not only form the practical chemist, but the ready, extemporaneous speaker.

To the Student, who is qualifying himself for the practice of Medicine, this course will be particularly useful, as a knowledge of practical chemistry is indispensable to the Physician.

The Mechanic will have an opportunity by the shortest course, to obtain a thorough knowledge of the science.

The working class will be distributed into divisions, each division occupying different hours in the day and evening, for the convenience of such as have other engagements.

Teachers and Students of the village may join a division which will meet at a time which will be most convenient for them.

Tuition will be \$5. for the course.

The course will commence on Thursday Evening the 17th instant. Such individuals as contemplate joining the class, will do well to make known their intention immediately.

In addition to the above mentioned course, Mr. Oatman will give a course of Public Lectures on the same subject, in the Chapel of the Institute, which is a commodious room for a large assembly. To be given one evening of each week, and to be supported by individuals and families, who will purchase tickets of attendance. The avails are to be applied for the benefit of the Institute.

The Course to commence on Tuesday evening the 22d instant.

Tickets of admission be, \$2. for a Gentleman—\$1. for a Lady, and \$4. for a Family.
